Message from the Board Chair & President and CEO

Stevenson Memorial Hospital (SMH) is a progressive, acute care, community-based hospital in New Tecumseth servicing South Simcoe and surrounding communities. This is your hospital, and we are proud to bring you the 2023/24 Annual Report.

There are many achievements to highlight over the past year, and there were some challenges as well. We worked closely with Ontario Health regarding the exploration of financial pressures and in February 2024, an investigation was issued to ensure optimal hospital performance and service delivery. We welcomed the review and the opportunity to highlight our strengths, as well as our challenges. The hospital is ending the fiscal year with a balanced budget.

We also made significant progress on our redevelopment planning, with early works construction taking place in the fall of 2023 to prepare our property for construction of the new expansion. This included the demolition and removal of the Mary McGill Mental Health/Administration building as well as a deforestation project. **Over 400 trees will be replanted as part of our landscaping plan for our redeveloped hospital.**

Our facility also received a facelift with new windows installed across the hospital in the winter of 2024, which was possible **thanks to the Ministry of Health's \$1 million Health Infrastructure Renewal Fund grant.**

Partnerships continue to be a very important aspect of our operations at SMH and in health care delivery. In December 2023, the amalgamation of the Southlake Community Ontario Health Team (OHT) and South Simcoe OHT took place, creating the North York South Simcoe OHT. Greater access to health care and improvements in the health care system will continue, and there has been much engagement with our local communities to ensure their voice is heard.

Creating capacity in our inpatient Med/Surg Unit continues to be a priority, with a strategy for Alternate Level of Care (ALC) patients (patients no longer needing acute hospital care, but are unable to be discharged home) at the forefront to ensure optimal patient flow. We have been very successful with the launch of the Stevenson@Home program in partnership with Bayshore HealthCare. **As of March 31, 2024 48 patients have been able to be transferred home with the supports they need.**

We would like to thank the staff, physicians and volunteers at SMH who serve our community, day in and day out, and ensure our hospital is running smoothly. We would like to also thank our community members for their ongoing support of our hospital.

Our Senior Leadership and Leadership Team has been steadfast in guiding our organization in line with our strategic plan and priorities, managing challenges and achieving success. Contributing to the success of our organization is our dedicated Board of Directors, who give countless hours to ensuring that SMH receives the

guidance it needs to meet the needs of our staff and community. We know that the future is bright at SMH and look forward to seeing the progress of our redevelopment project. SMH will continue to follow its Vision of Setting a New Standard in Community Hospital Care.

Our People

SMH Implements New Staff Roles

Over the 2023-24 year, 68 new staff were hired at SMH. The following new roles were introduced at the hospital:

- Transition Navigator
- Clinical Scholars
- Clinical Externs
- Dedicated Ambulance Offload Nurse

Transition Navigator

Our Transition Navigator supports patients who will be transferring out of hospital and either returning home, into the Stevenson@Home program or the Transitional Care Program at Riverwood Senior Living. This role works closely with patients and families to ensure they are informed, comfortable and prepared for the patient's transition.

Clinical Scholars

The Clinical Scholar role was introduced at SMH in the past year to support education initiatives with front-line nursing

staff. Clinical Scholars are paired with newly graduated nurses, internationally educated nurses and nurses wanting to upskill to ensure they have the support they need to transition into the nursing profession. They work closely with newly hired nurses, or nursing transferring to another unit.

Clinical Externs

In the 2023-24 year, Clinical Externs were integrated into the hospital for the first time, supporting our Emergency and Med/Surg Departments. Clinical Externs are students who are completing their nursing programs, and work closely with our SMH nursing team to get hands-on experience guided by our team.

Dedicated Ambulance Offload Nurse

The Ministry of Health has funded a Dedicated Offload Nurse Program through the County of Simcoe to local hospitals in support of reducing ambulance offload wait times within Emergency Departments, as well as flow of patients. In January 2024, our Dedicated Ambulance Offload Nurse role

was implemented. As a result, patients arriving by ambulance are able to be triaged in a timely manner and placed into the Emergency Department efficiently (as capacity allows). Delays for County EMS staff are also reduced, enhancing capacity for community paramedicine.

SMH Award of Excellence in Nursing Recipient

SMH was pleased to announce the winner of the 2024 SMH Award of Excellence in Nursing: Candace Hubacheck, RPN, Outpatient Department.

Candace has been with SMH for over 15 years and does her job as an RPN with such compassion. Candace is the only nursing support in the Outpatient Department, literally doing it all. From the Fracture Clinic to the Urology Clinic, and everything in between, Candace promotes the highest ethical standards to each and every patient she has an encounter with. Candace always ensures every patient receives the best care while at Stevenson, and always goes above and beyond for them.

Care at SMH

Senior-Friendly Committee

A Senior-Friendly Committee was created to ensure that SMH is keeping the needs of seniors at the forefront as a high patient population at the hospital. Topics such as updated wayfinding and signage, accessibility, space and additional supports are discussed regularly to enhance the experience of seniors at SMH.

Nurse Practitioner Clinic Increases Capacity

The Nurse Practitioner Clinic at SMH has **tripled** their patient roster in 2023-24 in comparison to last year with the addition of a second Nurse Practitioner. A positive response was received by the community after promoting the Clinic was accepting new patients. The Nurse Practitioner Clinic continues to care for patients without access to local primary care, including caring for patients with chronic illnesses, immunizations, falls prevention for seniors, injury prevention, maternal prenatal care and more.

Fracture Clinic 10-year Anniversary

In August 2023, SMH celebrated 10 years of service by the Fracture Clinic. In 10 years, Dr. Syndie Singer and her team have provided orthopaedic consultations and surgeries, caring for **over 10,000 patients and managing over 50,000 patient visits**. Dr. Singer, along with a dedicated team including administrative support, an RPN and an orthopaedic

technician, provide high-quality care and efficient service every week, from fractures and broken bones being splinted and needing a cast, to more complex, chronic injuries requiring surgery and post-op care.

High Performance in Day Surgery Volume

SMH is in the top three small-medium hospitals in the province for surgical performance and volume in Day Surgery. SMH has ranked third in Day Surgery volume, completing **over 4,200 surgeries** in the 2023-24 year. The number of surgeries in a day can fluctuate, anywhere from four to 25. These include orthopaedic surgeries, general surgery, gynecological or endoscopy procedures.

Investments

Window Replacement Project

In January 2024, SMH underwent an unprecedented project replacing patient room windows across the hospital thanks to a Health Infrastructure Renewal Fund (HIRF) grant from the Ministry of Health. **The hospital received \$1,058,000 million** in HIRF funding to replace the original windows of the hospital, which were almost 60 years old. The new windows increase efficiency with heating and cooling, will lower energy costs and will reduce noise and vibration,

a key element as the hospital plans to start construction on a new hospital building next year.

Technological Advancements

3terra Data

In early 2024, SMH enhanced their access to data through 3terra Data Quality Assist (DQA) for organizational reporting and to provide high quality hospital data for funding, performance analysis and benchmarking. Data quality is cross referenced with CCIS, BORN, ALC Wait time, IDS, and diagnostic imaging outpatient data from electronic medical records.

3terra provides case level reports for coding, summary reports, leadership and manager reports to access patient level data for analysis and the ability to create ad hoc reports using coded timely data that is reported to the Ministry of Health.

VOIP Phone System Update

The installation of the Cisco-based VOIP system has continued across the hospital throughout 2023-24 and was completed in May, 2024. The hospital is 100% on the new VOIP system including fax lines (Voice Over Internet Protocol). This is a significant project and upgrade across all areas of the hospital, lead by our IT Manager.





Our Partnerships

Stevenson@Home

In November 2023, SMH launched the Stevenson@Home program in partnership with Bayshore HealthCare. The program supports patients with their recovery process, allowing them to be discharged from the hospital sooner. The program also helps create capacity and optimal patient flow in the Med/Surg Unit. Care plans are created, identifying the specific services the individual may need at home, allowing for a seamless hospital discharge and home care experience. The Stevenson@Home team consists of a care transition navigator, nurses, personal support workers, occupational therapists, physiotherapists, social workers and dietitians in partnership with Bayshore HealthCare. Patients may stay with the program for up to 16-weeks. As of March 31, 2024, **48 patients** have received care at home through the program.

Transitional Care Unit

Our Transitional Care Unit (TCU) in partnership with Riverwood Senior

Living continues to be a successful program for patients needing additional support before they can be transferred home. This initiative supports our ALC patients and provides capacity in our Med/Surg Unit. In 2023-24, **28 patients** received care in the TCU.

OHT Amalgamation: Northern York South Simcoe OHT

In December 2023, the Southlake Community Ontario Health Team and the South Simcoe Ontario Health Team came together to create the new Northern York South Simcoe Ontario Health Team (OHT). Many factors, including increasing access to healthcare services for their communities, the proximity in geographic location, shared populations, and providing high-quality community healthcare were at the forefront of the decision to merge the two OHTs.

The Southlake Community OHT and the South Simcoe OHT both shared an overarching goal of bringing connected care to the communities they serve, ensuring that the unique needs

of their populations are met. The Northern York South Simcoe OHT will prioritize improving access to healthcare and reducing gaps in the healthcare system for our local communities.

Computerized Provider Order Management (CPOM) Project

In the Fall of 2023, the CPOM project had its kick-off in collaboration with Southlake Regional Health Centre and Oak Valley Health as part of our SHINE partnership. This is an enhancement to our Meditech Health Information System and process for health care providers. Staff and physicians will be transitioning from paper-based treatment plans/care documentation to entering this digitally. The project launch/Go Live is set to take place in 2025.

Trillium Gift of Life Network

SMH became an official partner with the Trillium Gift of Life Network in 2023 and became involved in BeADonor Month in April 2024, raising the BeADonor Month flag for the first time at the hospital. SMH continues to promote the importance of organ and tissue donation as a site that facilitates tissue donation at the hospital.



Redevelopment Update

In October 2023, The County of Simcoe presented a cheque for **\$1 million** towards Stevenson Memorial Hospital's redevelopment project. **This is the first installment of a \$10 million commitment** to the hospital's redevelopment through the Simcoe County Hospital Alliance, the largest funding commitment to the hospital's redevelopment project to date.

The redevelopment project includes a new **152,000 square-foot facility** which will wrap around the current hospital building. A complete redesign of the hospital's clinical areas, it will feature a new Emergency Department triple the size of the current space, new Laboratory, Surgical Suite, Birthing Unit, Medical/Surgical inpatient Unit, five-bed Level 2 ICU and Pharmacy. The hospital will grow to a **47-bed facility**, all with single occupancy patient rooms to meet infection prevention and control

best practices.

A significant amount of early works projects took place in the 2023-24 year to prepare the hospital's property for the expansion, as the construction of the new building is slated to take place in 2025.

In November 2023, the demolition and removal of the Mary McGill Community Mental Health building took place. The building was constructed in 1938 as a nursing residence, and over the years has housed many departments including Finance and Administration. It was also used for on-call sleep rooms for various clinical departments. In 1980, the Mary McGill Community Mental Health Program was created, occupying the main floor of the building. The Mental Health program moved into the main hospital building in July, 2023.

In March 2024, a deforestation project was completed to clear property designated for the new expansion, including for the construction of new parking lots. Many factors were considered in this property preparation, including the requirements of the

Migratory Birds Convention Act. In addition to the safe relocation of Pileated Woodpecker nests, four bat boxes will be installed on the property. All necessary approvals were granted by the local municipality and conservation authorities.

We have been working closely with the landscape consultant, the environmental consultant, and the municipality to ensure all best practices and bylaws are followed for the reforestation of the site. Green space and reforestation, including landscaping is a very important element and vision of the redevelopment plans. **SMH will be actively replanting 400 trees as part of the hospital's redevelopment plan, including native species to the area.**

SMH was successful in receiving an approval from the Ministry of Health on its Stage 1.3 Functional Program in March 2022, completing the Early Planning phase. Stage 2.1 Block Schematics has been submitted to the Ministry of Health, and work has been completed on Stage 2.2 Sketch Design, including advanced design concepts and plans.

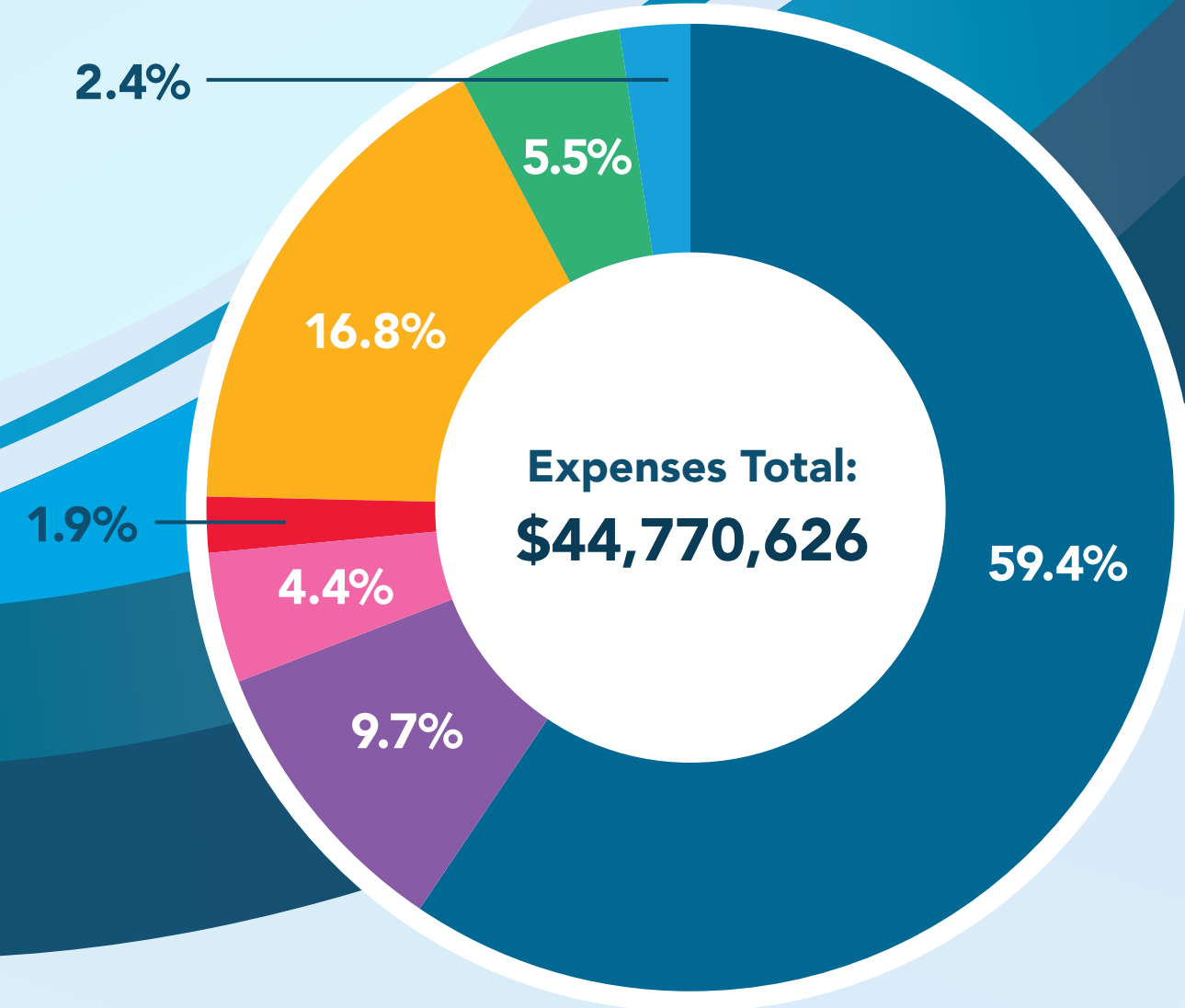
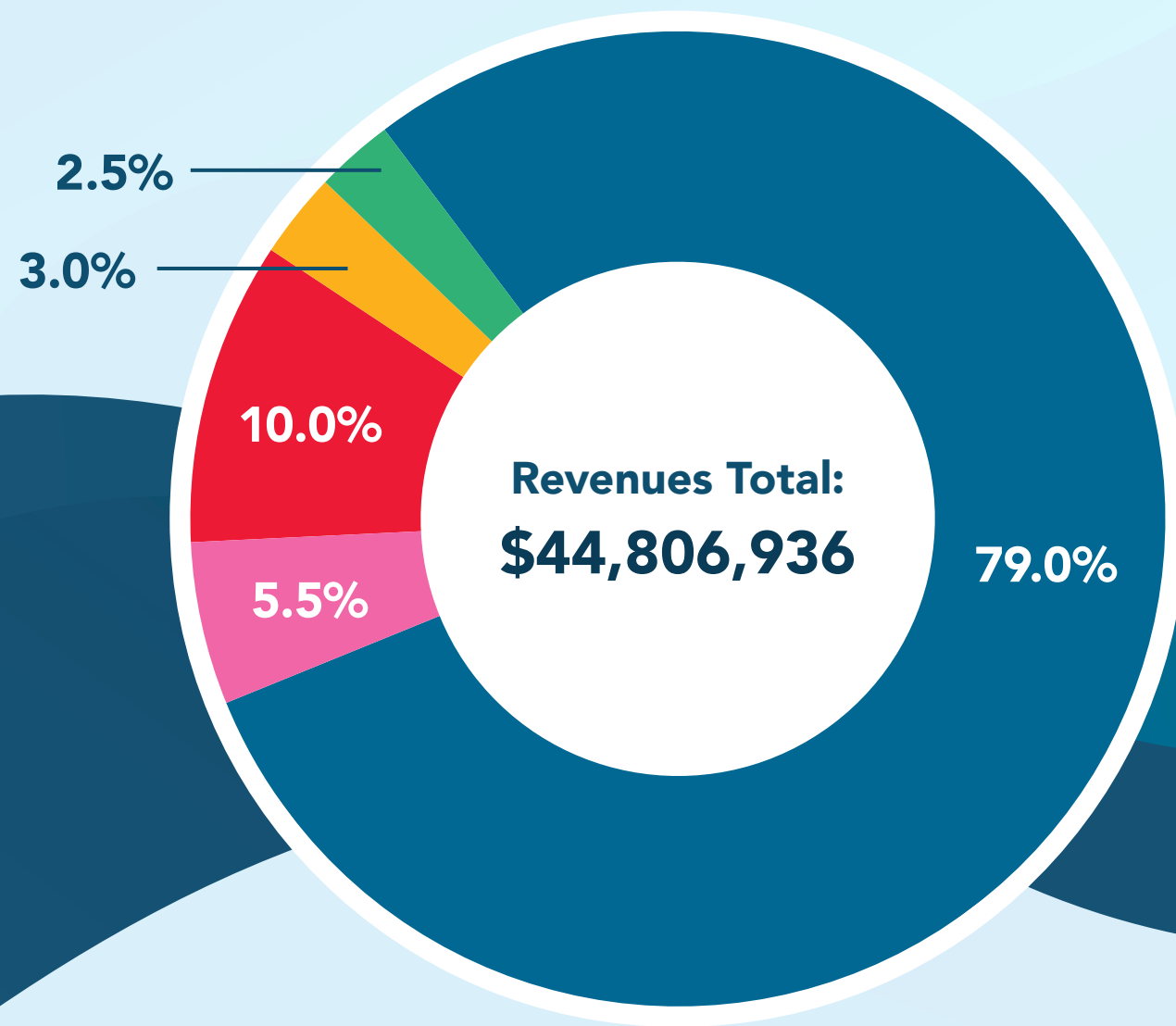

Meeting our Greatest Needs

At Stevenson—like every hospital—things can change in an instant. Patient conditions can change, and our capable doctors, nurses, and specialists need to be able to react to changing circumstances as quickly as possible.

What most people don't realize is that the hospital itself also needs to be flexible, adaptable, and quick-on-its-feet. It is our facilities and equipment that empower our staff to do their life-changing work, but what happens when equipment suddenly needs to be replaced, or new equipment needs to be purchased immediately?

Stevenson—like all Ontario hospitals—is responsible for purchasing new equipment. While grants do exist from the government, the vast majority of the equipment that is used at Stevenson has been purchased using donor funds. We truly are a community hospital!

Many of our donors specify a purpose for their gift: to go towards the purchasing of a specific piece of equipment, or to bolster a particular fund within our transformation campaign. But in honouring those donations, we are unable to use them to meet the hospital's immediate needs.

Donations designated to our Greatest Needs allows our Foundation the flexibility to invest where it is needed most to make an impact on medical staff while continuing to improve community healthcare and save the lives of patients. These "unrestricted" gifts are incredibly important to maintaining and improving our community's healthcare.

This year, we want to draw attention to two matching gifts that, together, helped to meet our Greatest Needs.

Your Greatest Chance to Meet Our Greatest Needs Matching Gift

Last year, the Morningview Foundation made an incredible impact: establishing a \$750,000 matching gift program to meet the hospital's greatest needs. Between July 1 and December 31, 2023, donors rallied to raise the full amount of the matching gift, resulting in a total of \$1.5 million being raised for the Foundation's Greatest Needs fund.

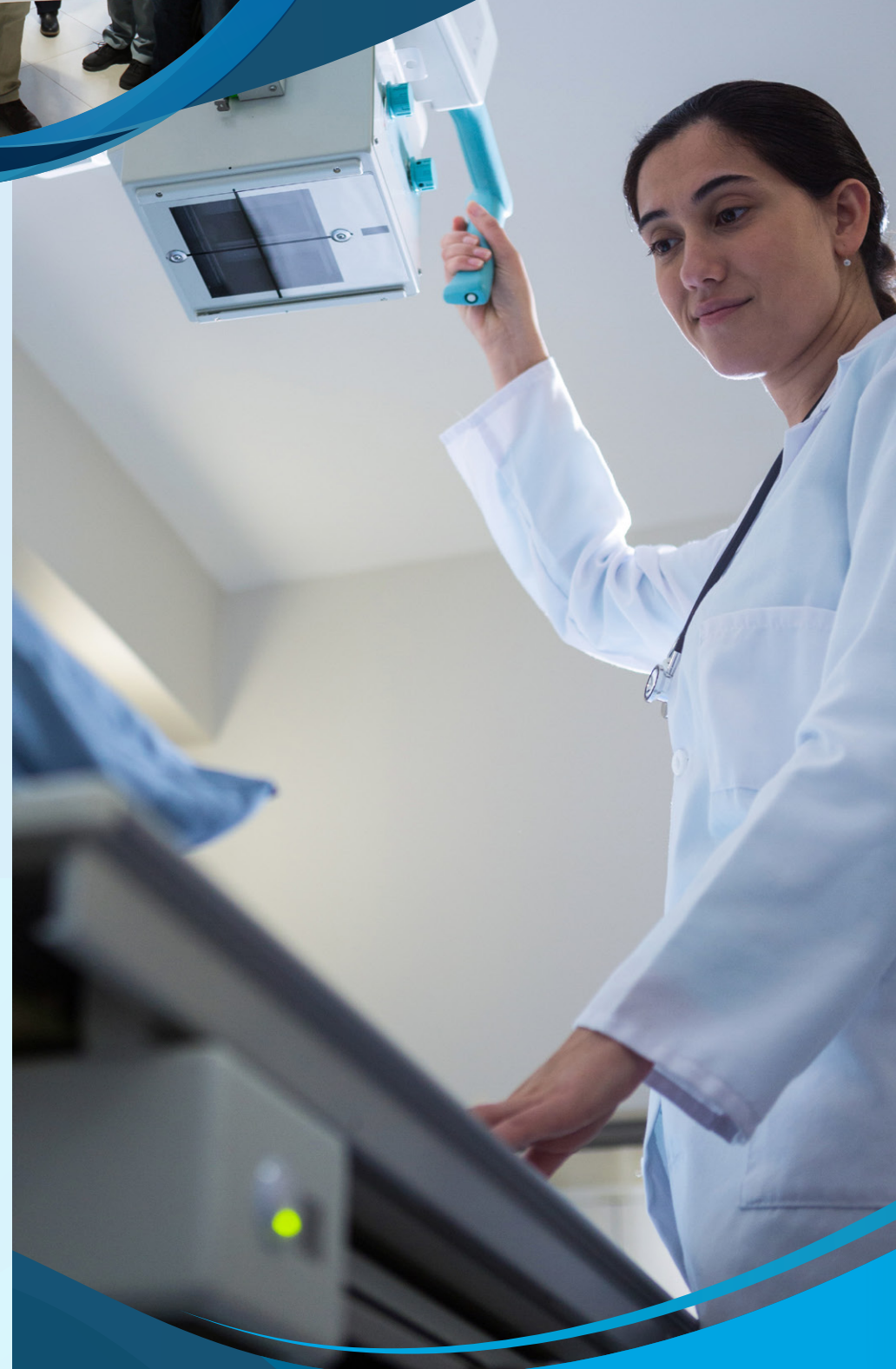
The Morningview Foundation has been a long-term supporter of the Stevenson Memorial Hospital Foundation, with this gift being the latest in an incredible relationship.

Gifts like Morningview's give the Foundation incredible flexibility in meeting the immediate needs of our hospital. In previous years, the hospital received direction from the provincial Ministry of Health that they needed to purchase eight new dialysis machines—machines that were not on the annual equipment purchase list. Thanks to a robust Greatest Needs fund, the Foundation was able to purchase the machines—totalling \$250,000—without impacting our overall plans.

The Alan and Brenda Lundy Matching Gift

A \$50,000 matching gift was made by Alan and Brenda Lundy—long-term supporters of the Foundation—to support the purchase of a Fetal Central Monitoring System. In the span of two months, the community rose to the occasion and surpassed the matching gift, raising \$128,000 towards the acquisition of the system.

"I would like to take this opportunity to thank the Lundy Family for the generous donation towards acquiring a Central Monitoring System for the Labour and Delivery Unit," says Crystal Irvin, RN, Manager of Inpatient Medicine, Maternal Child Program and Patient Flow. "The Lundys are long-standing community members and have had multiple generations born at Stevenson Memorial Hospital. I have had the privilege of being part of some of these deliveries. I want to thank the Lundy Family for thinking of us and investing in our amazing community and hospital. Your gift will positively impact our newest and tiniest community members for generations to come."

Community Partner Our thanks to Somerville Nurseries for their Growing Support

How many people do you know who are named after a hospital?

Local businessman Fred Somerville knows of one: it's his uncle, the late David Stevenson Somerville. David's claim to fame came early: he was the first baby to be born at Stevenson way back when our now-outdated hospital was shiny and new.

Today, Fred, President and part owner of Somerville Nurseries Inc., and his brothers Tom and Robert represent the fourth generation of leadership at their growing business.

Although Somerville Nurseries moved to Everett in 2000, the Somerville family is deeply rooted in Alliston. In 1929, Fred's great grandfather bought 60 acres in town and opened a lumber company where the Zehrs' Plaza is now. A sawmill started in 1929 and Fred's father, John Thomson Somerville, began planting trees in the early 1950s. Today, Somerville Nurseries Inc. is one of Canada's largest producers of Christmas trees, nursery stock, and Ontario native tree seedlings.

For a large family with deep roots in the area for more than a century, it should come as no surprise that having a hospital close to home has been a real blessing.

Two family stories are legendary...

The first took place in the 1940s when Fred's great aunt, Lowella Thomson, had acute appendicitis. Long before patients in crisis were airlifted to hospital by helicopter, Lowella was rushed by a horse-drawn cutter from Mansfield before changing horses in Everett en route to Alliston.

And then in the Sixties or early Seventies, Fred's Uncle Delmus had a heart attack. Fred says that family members didn't call an ambulance. Because his uncle literally lived next door to Stevenson Memorial, they carried Delmus to the hospital and even "tossed" him over the fence in their haste to get him to Emerg. As if a heart attack weren't bad enough, we can't help but wonder if Delmus had to be treated for other injuries!

Thankfully, the family hasn't added any more shocking stories to their Stevenson storybook for decades. Even so, with a large extended family living close by, Fred visited Stevenson Memorial Hospital numerous times. "I never cease to be amazed by the number of patients that the Hospital attends to every day," he says in awe. "It's

always busy, and it's getting busier as the population grows."

And although Fred, like many people, "thought that our tax dollars would pay for the new hospital and all the equipment that's needed," he was "gobsmacked" to learn that our community needs to raise millions of dollars to ensure we continue to enjoy the very best care.

"Our family has always supported the Hospital. It's a worthy investment in the health of our community," Fred says. "People need hospitals and Stevenson Memorial Hospital benefits everyone." And then in closing, Fred adds, "We need to do more. We need to do everything we can to help keep health care close to home."

As we conclude this year's impact report, we extend a heartfelt thanks to you, our community. Without your incredible support, generosity, and passion, we would not be able to build for tomorrow. 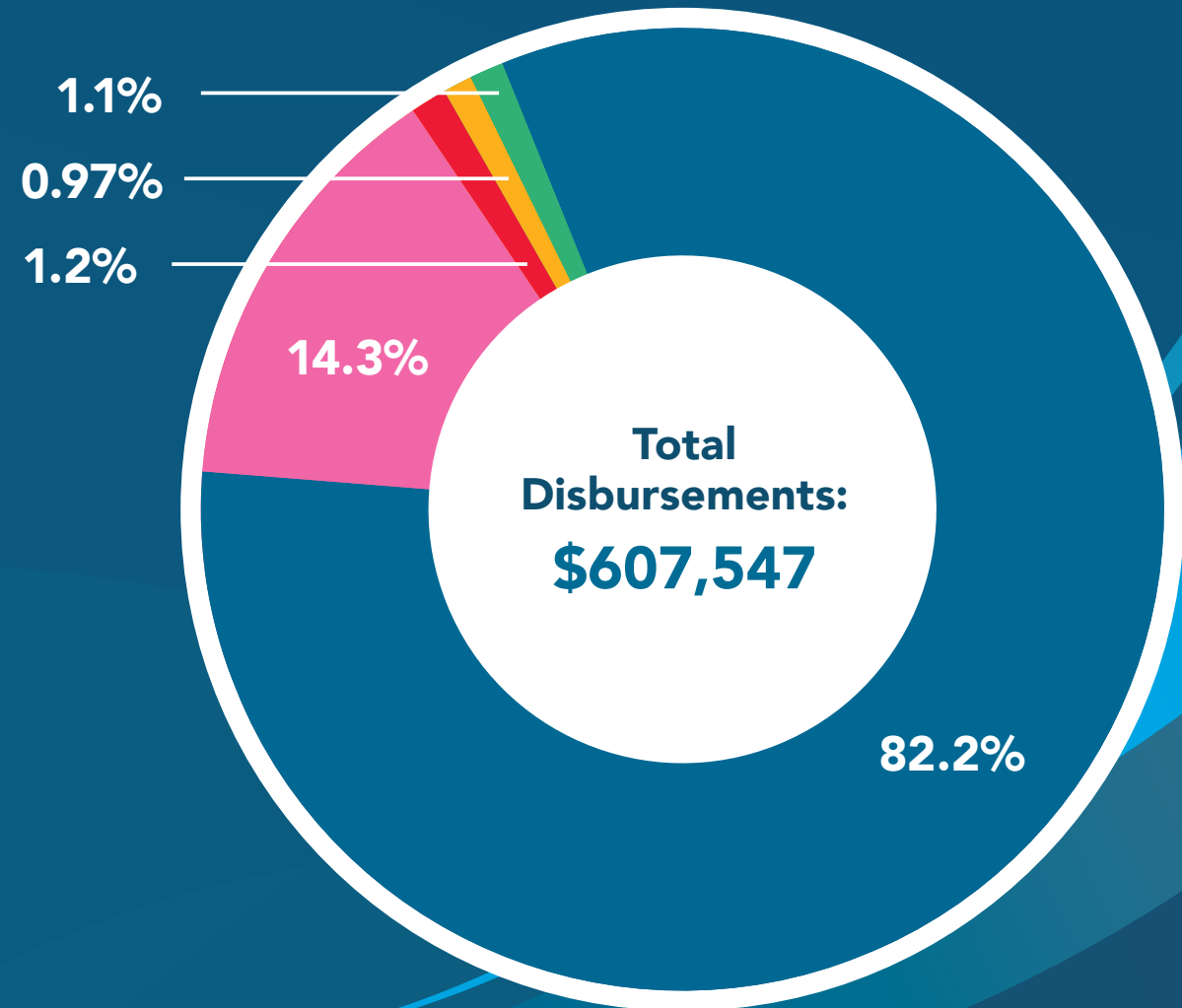
